Beginner's Fly Tying: Egg-Sucking Leech

Hope that everyone had a wonderful holiday and that these early winter days have given you an opportunity to relax with a favorite beverage, while you tie some flies for the coming colder months. For our January Beginner's (virtual) Fly Tying session, I have chosen another streamer pattern, which I and several of our club members use for catching stocked trout, as well as steelhead, during the winter months. The pattern is commonly called an *egg-sucking leech*.



Closely resembling a standard woolly bugger, the bright color

woolly bugger, the bright colored yarn or bead tied in at the front of the fly seems to enhance the fish's interest in the fly (see note below, regarding the use of flies with egg heads). Materials and instructions for tying my version of the egg-sucking leech will be provided to all who sign up for the January session.

From my internet search: *Egg Sucking Leech a Deeper Look at a Controversial Fly* – "Contrary to popular belief, flies with egg heads have been around for close to 200 years. This makes it difficult to validate arguments that we shouldn't fish egg-

suckers because they're not traditional. Flies like the Dallas, Toppy, and Beauly Snow flies were finished with tufts (technically termed ruffs) of red, orange, yellow and green mohair — essentially turning beautiful classic flies into really expensive, time-consuming egg-suckers. Even leech flies have been tied as early as the 1700s, with The Horse Leech Fly from Brookes' 'Art of Angling' mentioned in 1740. Classic fly tyer, Dave Carne adds that it's important to note that most of the bright-head flies were primarily used as spring patterns."

Announcing Our New Mentor Program for 2021


assing down knowledge of fly fishing from one generation to another is part of the educational mission of the Potomac Valley Fly Fishers.

To that end, we will be instituting a new mentor program for the coming year. Soon, we will be sending out an email to all members with the details and asking for volunteers to be a mentor to a beginning fly fisherman.

The program will be geared toward helping folks that have little or no experience in fly fishing. Volunteer mentors will provide customized

instruction, both on and off the stream, in all areas of fly fishing and introduce them to club activities. The overall goal is to recruit more club members and produce capable, self-sufficient fly fisherman who will become long time club members and contribute to club activities.

Once the program is up and running, a person who needs a mentor will go to the PVFF website, read about the program, and submit a web form that asks



a few questions about experience level, where and for what species they want to fish, what equipment they have, and some other basic information. Then they will be paired with a mentor that matches their needs. So if you ever thought that you have a good base of fly fishing knowledge that could be of use to a beginning fisherman, please consider volunteering to be a mentor. And if you are just starting out on your fly fishing journey, we hope to soon have a roster of club members willing to help.

Project Healing Waters: Crittermite and Casting

In our latest installment of online fly tying seminars, Colin Flournoy took the veterans through the more advanced Crittermite fly. Released by Fly Fishing Hall of Famer Bob Kraft in 2014, the Crittermite is a deadlier version of the hellgrammite.

As with the hellgrammite, the Crittermite is meant to be fished on the bottom of larger rivers like the Monocacy or Potomac with good water flow. The best way to fish this fly is to cast to the center and retrieve to the edges using short strips. Smallmouth bass love these flies, as well as large browns (16" plus) but be prepared to bring heavier rods (7wt to

8wt) with floating line to get the fly out where it needs to be.

Jim Lowell continued his casting clinic, focusing on the basics: *back cast, pause, and forward cast.* To get the tightest possible loops, you must balance mechanics vs. feel. You can have the best mechanics in the world, but if you are not patient on your backstroke (feel the bump) then your foreword stroke will waste both power and accuracy, not only coming up short but also spooking the fish and leading to lost opportunities.

PVFF to Start an Advanced Fly Tying Group

This month, we will hold our first meeting for Advanced Fly Tying on Jan. 20th at 7 PM on Zoom. Here's how meetings of the Advanced Fly Tying Group will work. Each participant will be responsible for leading a tying session for at least one monthly meeting during the year. The leader for any given month will select the 'fly of the month' and show how it is tied during the meeting. Thus, if we have 12 tying members in the group, each member of the group would lead a session once per year.

Prior to the meeting which you are scheduled to lead, **you would supply only the recipe** (via email) for the fly to the other members. Then each member would be responsible for getting his/her necessary materials before the tying session — not the lead tier. The leader's sole responsibility is to show the group how to tie the fly. To be part of the group, we encourage participants to consider tying skills are that of an intermediate – advanced fly tier. Those who are new to fly tying would be expected to continue participating in the monthly Beginner's fly tying session, until they are proficient at the basic tying skills. Members of the Advanced Fly Tying Group are not excluded from their continued participation in the monthly Beginner's sessions. Also, as part of the group, your participation requires you to lead one tying session each year (assuming that there are at least 12 members).
