Beginner Fly Tying Hogan's Winter Leech

In selecting the fly pattern for our November session, I chose Hogan's Winter Leech. This pattern will further enhance the tying skills of our Beginner's class as well as to provide a great fly for fishing into the winter months. As I have noted in previous issues of our Streamlines Newsletter, we fly fishers need to have diverse fly patterns that we can use throughout the four seasons of the year. A successful fly fisher will choose an artificial with reference to the natural food sources available to the fish.

Advanced Fly Tying

At our Advanced Fly Tying gathering, on November 20th at 7:00pm, I will lead the session, during which we will tie the G&H Sedge dry fly that I used in Scotland to fool a couple of brown trout (see my article on this trip below).

John Goddard, an English angler and writer active through much of the middle of the twentieth-century, designed over 50 fly patterns. The most famous of these was the G&H sedge, a deer hair caddis pattern developed by Goddard and his friend Cliff Henry (hence the name).

Big Hunting Creek Working Group to Meet

The Big Hunting Creek Working Group will be meeting on Wednesday, November 20 at 1 p.m. in Thurmont. This is a working group coordinated by PVFF and includes representatives from Trout Unlimited, the Brotherhood of the Jungle Cock, Catoctin Mountain National Park, Cunningham Falls State Park, and the Maryland Department of Natural Resources. The goal is to address issues affecting the trout fishery in Big Hunting Creek and the other nearby Catoctin streams.

At the meeting on November 20th, we will discuss our ongoing projects and hear a presentation from the Maryland DNR on the results of their trout population surveys this summer. We will also be distributing the "Fly Fisherman's Guide to Big Hunting Creek" brochure that the group has updated and printed. Any interested club members are invited to attend.

Meet a Member Jay Blincoe

How long have you been flyfishing?

I've been fly fishing for about 10 years. I grew up fishing in small ponds and lakes in Virginia. Moving to Frederick gave me the opportunity to pursue fly fishing with all of the small streams and rich fly fishing culture we have here.

What type of fly fishing do you like the most?

Probably smallmouth fishing simply because in the bigger rivers, you're oftentimes more apt to catch something more often when going for more fickle trout. It's exciting to throw bigger flies across the Potomac, but ultimately it comes down to smallmouth being such a hard fighting and exciting sport fish. That and it's easier to thread line through the eye of larger flies as I get older.

What is your favorite water to fish?

I haven't fished extensively outside of the region, but I'd say the Beaverkill river in the Catskills.

What is your best fly fishing memory?

Fortunately for me, a family member has property in the Catskills, and I've been fortunate enough to fish the Beaverkill river from time to time. A few years back on the 4th of July, I landed a large trout on a reverse cast just after a bald eagle flew over. A movie worthy moment in American fly fishing!

What is your favorite fly?

I don't really have one, I largely just guess based on rough observation. I'll say that recently I bought a Spotted Lanternfly pattern. The more we can encourage fish to go after them, the better!

Tell us more about yourself. What do you enjoy doing besides fishing?

I love to cook, I'm active in the local bluegrass scene as a musician, listen to a lot of music of varying genres, and am also an avid cyclist. I use my bicycle to quickly get from point to point when fishing if I'm able. I'm an avid gardener, live in downtown Frederick, have two dachshunds, and being the owner of an old house, spend most of my fishing time at the Home Depot.

What advice do you have for others?

I don't really have any advice about fishing, but as above, I have a broad range of activities and experience in my personal and professional life. As far as fly fishing — like anything else — just be patient and despite the skill level or experience of other folks, just try to enjoy being out there and not getting too frustrated. I give this same advice to musicians just starting out who may be intimidated by others.

Otherwise, try and get some sleep, some exercise, eat lots of vegetables, and be patient and kind to those around you.

** Alternate, shorter answer: Buy a jetboil for those colder days** A hot cup of soup streamside in the fall is incredible.

What is your bucket list flyfishing trip?

Upper Midwest for Pike or Muskie.

When did you join the club?

A few years ago in November, if I recall. I really like the outings and the annual dinner.

Do you have any memories of past club events or members you'd like to share?

The latest Monocacy wade for smallmouth was great, as I did reasonably well, but moreover I got to experience a member catching their first smallmouth, so that was a nice moment to witness as someone fishing just upstream. Notably, it was a young woman who caught this fish, so it was nice to see some diversity in the club outside of our usual demographic.



Fishing for Native Browns in Scotland

This past June, my family and I had an amazing vacation in Scotland. The scenery was beautiful, the weather cooperated (it rained only one day during our trip), and the whisky was incredible. Add a day of fly-fishing, and you have a perfect vacation!

A couple of months before our trip, I reached out to YouFishScotland, based in Inverness. My wife arranged for us to be there for 4 nights. I explained that this was a family vacation and that I would not have any fly-fishing gear or waders with me. Plus, I had no transportation. They said no problem, and they would provide everything. They could not have been easier to work with.

For my day of fishing, I had three options. Inverness, which is at the northern tip of Loch Ness, is known for its salmon fishing on the River Ness. Also, you can also fly fish for large browns in Loch Ness from a boat. However, when my guide gave me

the option to fish a couple small mountain streams, my decision was easy. I wanted to catch a native brown trout.

Colin, my guide for the day, picked me up at our AIRBNB at 9 a.m. and off we went. The drive to the stream was about an hour up into the mountains. At first, I was a little concerned. As we are driving, Colin said to me: "I have never taken a client to this stream before." Okay — not what you want to hear from your guide. However, he followed-up with "My mum went to school with the owner of the farm, and no one fishes this stretch of the stream, except me." Now that sounded better.

We arrived at the stream and checked in with the owners. The scenery is just incredible. Being from around here, you expect to see the mountains covered with trees and foliage. Not in this part of Scotland. Instead, you see beautiful mountains with very few trees.

We walk about a ¼ mile to the stream and the first thing I noticed was the color of the water. Instead of crystal-clear water, it's dark brown. This is a result of the peat in the soil. The stream connects two lochs. Resident brown trout in the stream are between 8 and 10 inches. However, larger browns migrate down from the loch above during the summer and are between 12 and 15 inches. The cool thing about the brown trout is that they are natives whose ancestors have been around since the last ice age. Not something that you will ever catch in the US.



Colin rigged-up my 3wt with a G&H sedge dry fly (size 12) and a copper john (size 14) dropper, about 36" from the dry fly. On my 3rd cast, my sedge paused and went under water. I lifted my rod and set the hook on my first native brown trout, caught on the copper john. What a great start to a fun day; I had met my goal.

The stream varies between 15' – 30' wide with a few trees along the bank. For the next 4 hours, we worked our way upstream. The action was steady and the fishing was a blast. The majority of the brown trout were caught with the sedge dry fly. I was mostly blind casting to fishy looking spots. However, a couple of times I did fish to rising trout.

One of the highlights was catching 2 brown trout at the same time. I was fishing a section with a couple of trees along the opposite side the stream. Colin had me cast up and under one of the hanging branches. As the sedge drifted under the branch, it paused for a second. I lifted the rod and set the hook with the copper john. Just as I did that, another brown came up and hit the sedge fly. Colin immediately yelled: "You have 2 trout on!" I tried not to get too excited. Fortunately, Colin jumped into the stream with his net and landed both fish. That was pretty cool. Without Colin, I know that I would not have landed both.

It was a day to remember! I'm still smiling just thinking about it. If you travel to Inverness, Scotland, I recommend Colin and the folks at YouFishScotland.
